EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The Ned Houk Master Plan is the culmination of a planning and design effort that commenced in April 2023. The City of Clovis was awarded an Outdoor Recreation Trails Grant from the New Mexico Outdoor Recreation Division to develop the Master Plan for Ned Houk Park. The purpose of the Master Plan is to provide a systematic, phased approach to identify capital improvements and increase the use of the City's largest park facility, with an emphasis on ADA accessibility. The City recognized that while Ned Houk Park provides opportunities for hiking, picnicking, fishing, shooting practice and archery, disc golf, bird watching, and other activities, it has not reached its full potential as a regional park facility. The City also acknowledged that Ned Houk Park has the potential to increase its portion of the outdoor recreation economy by increasing local participation and attracting new visitors from New Mexico, Texas, and the southwest region.

The overarching goal of the Master Plan is to help ensure the recreational needs of Park users are met through a series of improvements that will increase the usability of Ned Houk Park. The Master Plan provides a conceptual level of design for the following:

- ◀ Improvements to the two day use areas, Patch Work Place and Pow Wow Pass, including new pedestrian pathways, designated ADA parking spaces and accessible pathways, consolidated play areas and group shelters, dog park, amphitheater, new shade structures, comfort station, vault toilet, etc.
- ◀ Expansion of the fishing pond at Patch Work Place and the addition of a water quality drainage feature to address erosion and silt blowing into the pond.
- ◀ New amphitheater at Patch Work Place with the expanded fishing pond as its back drop.

- ◀ Expanded 9-hole disc golf area at Patch Work Place.
- ◀ A future RV campground with 37 campsites (including two accessible campsites), a social gathering area with two seating areas, a comfort station with toilet and shower facilities, pedestrian pathways, and a vault toilet.
- ◀ Expanded, improved, and contained motorsports trail area, Motorsports Complex, and a Drag Strip.
- ◀ New tree plantings to provide shade and respite from the sun and wind.
- ◀ Signage and wayfinding.
- ◀ Security cameras.

HISTORY OF NED HOUK PARK

Prior to being named after Ned Houk, a former Mayor (1931 to 1933 and from 1951 to 1953) and City Commissioner (17 years), the area was known as Running Water Draw. A 150-mile ephemeral watercourse heading approximately 24 miles northwest of Clovis, through Ned Houk Park, and southeast into Texas, Running Water Draw joins the Callahan Draw at the head of the White River. Running Water Draw drains a 1,620 square mile area that extends into Curry County, and Parmer, Castro, Lamb, Hale, and Floyd counties in Texas.

In 1954, the United States government gave the acreage to the City of Clovis. In 1960, there was a catastrophic flooding event in Plainview, Texas, resulting in \$1 million in damages. Then in 1962, the Hale County, Texas Soil Conservation District began to consider flood protection dams to be built upstream from Plainview. The agreement to build the dam in Ned Houk Park was made in 1974 and construction followed soon after.

1.2 PARKS, RECREATION, & BEAUTIFICATION COMMITTEE

The City of Clovis has a robust Parks and Recreation Department that maintains the parks and recreation facilities in Clovis, including Ned Houk Park. The Parks and Recreation Director coordinates and works closely with the Parks, Recreation, & Beautification Committee. The Committee is a 10-member board appointed by the Mayor, with the consent of the City Commission. The members include four City Commissioners, one from each district; four Clovis residents, one from each district; one resident of Curry County; and a representative from a group that utilizes parks and recreation services. The Mayor, City Manager or designee, Parks and Recreation Director, and a representative from Clovis Municipal Schools serve as ex-officio members and advisors to the Committee. The non-Commissioner members serve two year terms, which are staggered with two of the citizen members to have an initial term of one year.

The Parks, Recreation, & Beautification Committee is responsible for making recommendations and administering recreational programs; policies and fee structures; development and improvement of parks and recreational services; adoption of standards for facilities, programs, and financial resources; coordinating with other agencies; etc. The Committee's responsibilities specifically related to Ned Houk Park include the following:

- ◀ Review and oversight of current and future recreational activities held at Ned Houk Park.
- ◀ Oversight of the grazing leases at Ned Houk Park.

As part of the master planning process, the consultants met with the Parks, Recreation, and Beautification Committee several times, both in person and on-line at various project

milestones. The Committee provided feedback on the Community Survey, alternative programming concepts, and specific amenity areas within the Park, such as the RV campground area, motorsports, multi-use trail system, etc. The consultant also presented the final draft of the Master Plan to the Committee on June 17, 2024, which provided an unanimous recommendation of approval to the City Commission. The Master Plan reflects the feedback provided by the Parks, Recreation, and Beautification Committee, as well as the results of the Community Survey.

1.3 OUTDOOR RECREATION OUTDOOR RECREATION ECONOMY

The outdoor recreation economy continues to grow in every state, including New Mexico. In November 2023, the US Commerce Department Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA) released data from 2022 showing value added of the outdoor recreation economy in the United States accounted for 2.2% (\$563.7 billion) of current-dollar gross domestic product (GDP).

New Mexico's outdoor recreation economy has been outpacing the national average in three principal measurements, including GDP, employment, and compensation. The BEA data showed the economic output for the outdoor recreation economy in New Mexico was \$2.3 billion (2.1% of GDP) an increase of \$400 million over 2020. This is a 2.5% higher growth rate than the industry saw at the national level.

In 2021, the outdoor recreation sector employed 28,475 New Mexicans - an increase of 18.2% from 2020 and over 5% above the national average. This rise in jobs ranked New Mexico 5th amongst all states in outdoor recreation employment growth. Compensation also grew by 17.3% statewide, compared with a 16.2% growth rate nationally.

The BEA categorized outdoor recreation activities into three general categories and identified the value added for each category at the national level:

- ◀ Conventional activities such as bicycling, boating, hiking, and hunting (34.2%)
- ◀ Other activities such as gardening and outdoor concerts (19.8%)
- ◀ Supporting activities such as construction, travel and tourism, local trips, and government expenditures (46.0%)

The BEA showed value added by activity in 2022 for the nation:

- ◀ RVing was the largest conventional activity for the nation at \$35.5 billion in current-dollar value added and was the largest conventional activity in 22 states.
- ◀ Boating/fishing was the second-largest conventional activity for the nation at \$32.4 billion in current-dollar value added and was the largest conventional activity in 24 states and the District of Columbia.
- ◀ Motorcycling/ATVing was the third-largest conventional activity for the nation at \$11.5 billion in current-dollar value added.
- ◀ Snow activities for the nation was \$7.0 billion in current-dollar value added.

Specific to New Mexico, RVing, all-terrain vehicle/motorcycling, bicycling, snow activities, equestrian, hunting/shooting/trapping, climbing/hiking/tent camping, and recreational flying all demonstrated growth in contributing to the state's GDP.

These metrics demonstrate that the City of Clovis is in an excellent position to increase its slice of the outdoor recreation economy by improving Ned Houk Park and focusing its efforts on those activities that continue to increase participation from the local and regional community. With the exception of snow activities, the Master Plan provides for the establishment and/or expansion of these

outdoor recreation activities.

NEW MEXICO OUTDOOR RECREATION DIVISION

Since the establishment of the New Mexico Outdoor Recreation Division (ORD) in April 2019, the outdoor recreation economy has continued to grow throughout the state. The legislation also established the Outdoor Equity Fund, a grant program designed to help underserved youth get outdoors. Since its creation in 2019, the Outdoor Equity Fund has granted over \$5.7 million to nearly 250 organizations throughout the state.

The ORD also administers the Outdoor Recreation Trails+ Grant program, which is intended to fund shovel-ready projects. The program has awarded 134 grants totaling \$13 million for projects in 26 counties, including funding for the Ned Houk Park Master Plan. The ORD established the Outdoor Marketing Grants program in 2023 with the objective to expand opportunities for participation in the outdoor recreation industry. There were 41 grants awarded with a total value of \$873,872; over 63% of the recipients were based in rural areas of New Mexico.

The City of Clovis should explore new opportunities to apply for grants for design and construction of the various amenities identified in the Master Plan.

1.3 COMMUNITY SURVEY

The planning process included the design and administration of a Community Survey by the consultant. The Community Survey ran from June 14 to July 31, 2023, and was available online via Survey Monkey and printed copies. A total of 778 people responded to the Community Survey, which included 11 questions. Some of the questions allowed the participants to choose more than one answer, while other questions required a single response. Several questions gave the option

of “other” so that participants could add written comments. For the full results of the Community Survey, see Appendix A.

Key takeaways from the survey results follow below:

Respondent Profile

- ◀ 56% of participants were female
- ◀ 47% have lived in Clovis for more than 20 years and 25% for 1-5 years
- ◀ 71% described themselves as white and 23% described themselves as Hispanic
- ◀ 32% had a household income of \$100,000 or more

I am interested in the future of Ned Houk Park because:

- ◀ 79% of the responses indicate participants use the Park to enjoy the outdoors; 72% said they would like to see improvements at the Park, and 38% of the responses indicate they are interested in preserving open space.
- ◀ 69 written responses - many participants support disc golf, some cited pickleball courts, tennis courts, wildlife habitat, horseback riding.

What types of activities have you participated in at Ned Houk Park?

- ◀ 72% of the responses indicated walking/hiking, 67% were family gatherings, and 40% were fishing.
- ◀ 236 written responses – disc golf, family events, tennis, photography, running, playgrounds, bike riding and geocaching, picnics, dog walking, astronomy, model airplanes

When was the last time you visited Ned Houk Park?

- ◀ 54% said within the last month and 26% said within the last 2 to 6 months
- ◀ 11 people said they’ve never visited the Park

What would you like to do in the Park that is either not offered currently or is offered at the Park but should be expanded?

- ◀ Outdoor concerts was the most popular response, with 55% of the responses. 52% said walking/hiking on a dedicated trail network; 46% said play areas (like sandbox, horseshoes, cornhole)
- ◀ Motor sports, drag racing, and competition biking received the least number of responses
- ◀ 152 written responses – disc golf, tennis and pickleball, concerts, water park, outdoor movies, sand volleyball, dog park, trails, overnight camping

What should be the City’s top two priorities for improving the Park?

- ◀ 54% of the responses said improve the existing day use area (social gathering areas, picnic tables, play areas, parking); 40% said improve the existing ponds; and 37% said develop a dedicated trail network
- ◀ 135 written comments – disc golf, pickleball and tennis, outdoor concerts, adding futsal (soccer), overnight camping and campsites with hookups, splash pad, equestrian facilities, ADA improvements, restrooms

If improvements were made, how likely would you or your family be to visit the Park more often?

- ◀ 92% said very likely or likely and 6% said depends on the type of improvement

2.1 INTRODUCTION

The Community Profile provides the policy framework contained in the Clovis Comprehensive Plan and the Clovis Parks and Recreation Master Plan relevant to parks and recreation. It also provides a brief summary of population and demographic trends in Clovis.

2.2 PLANS and POLICIES

CLOVIS COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

The Clovis Comprehensive Plan was adopted by the City Commission in 2018. The Comprehensive Plan is the overarching planning document for the community, providing policy guidance in the form of goals, objectives, and strategies, many of which focus on the provision of public facilities and services for Clovis residents, including parks and recreation facilities and activities. All other plans, policies, and regulations that address land use and development should be consistent with the Comprehensive Plan.

The following goals, objectives, and strategies relevant to the Ned Houk Park Master Plan and parks and recreation are as follows:

Community Services and Facilities Goal 2

Maintain a comprehensive system of parks and recreational facilities.

Objective 2.1: To meet the recreational and fitness needs of youth, teens, adults, and seniors.

Objective 2.2: To ensure residents of Clovis have equal access and reasonable proximity to parks and recreational facilities.

Strategy 2.1: Pursue and allocate funding for improvements to existing park and recreation facilities, as identified in the 2015 Parks and Recreation Master Plan and the FY2020-2024 ICIP.

Community Services and Facilities Goal 3

Expand and maintain a full spectrum of community facilities and programming for Clovis residents.

Objective 3.1: To ensure community facilities meet the multi-generational needs of current and future residents.

Objective 3.2: To provide for the delivery of support services, programs, and educational opportunities for residents of all ages.

CLOVIS PARKS and RECREATION MASTER PLAN

The Clovis Parks and Recreation Master Plan was adopted by the City Commission in 2015. The Master Plan is intended to provide guidance to elected officials and City staff as they make decisions regarding the rehabilitation and improvement of existing park and recreational facilities, and acquisition of new parkland to meet the recreational needs of the community. The Master Plan provides the framework for determining the type, location, and the number of facilities to address demand over a 10 year planning horizon. The Master Plan is also intended to provide assistance to the City in requesting and obtaining funding for capital improvements from federal, state, local, and other sources.

The Master Plan recognizes Ned Houk Park as the City's only designated regional park facility, which are typically very large sites encompassing unique qualities that exemplify the natural features, diverse land formations, and the variety of vegetation and wildlife found in the region. At the time of the Master Plan, only 369 acres out of the 3,200 acres comprising Ned Houk Park were developed.

2.3 POPULATION CHARACTERISTICS

HISTORIC POPULATION

The population of Clovis has historically been influenced by the coming of the railroad and Cannon AFB. Today, Clovis population is closely aligned to mission changes at Cannon AFB. As shown in Figure 2.1, the population in Clovis grew by 7,311 between 1980 and 2021. Most of the growth occurred between 2000 and 2010, when the population grew by 5,108. Since 2010, the population has been relatively stable.

POPULATION BY AGE

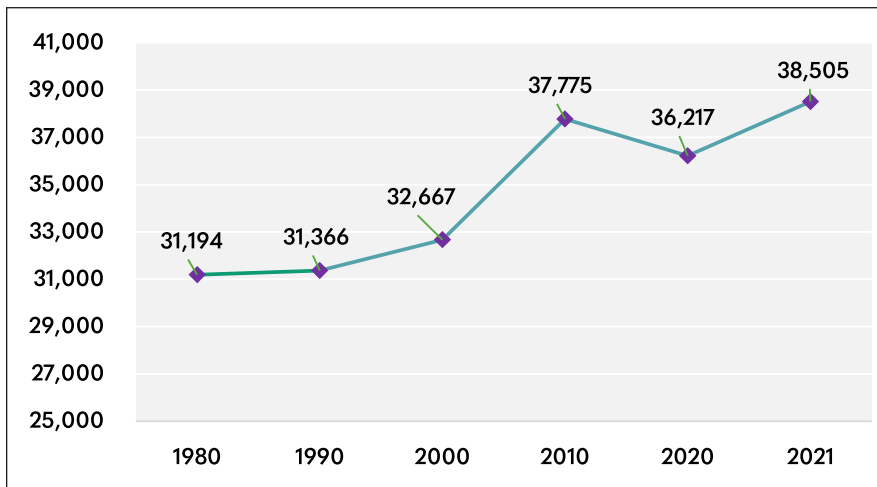
Between 2011 and 2021, the population of Clovis grew by 4.5%, from 36,830 to 38,505. The largest growth rate was within the 30 to 34 years cohort, 57.9%, likely influenced by Cannon AFB. The second highest growth rate was within the age cohort of 85 years and over, which grew by 55.4%. The male segment of the population grew at a higher rate than females, 5.9% versus 3.1%.

The median age slightly decreased by 1.2% between 2011 and 2021; from 32.2 to 31.8 years. In comparison, the median age in New Mexico grew by 4.9%, from 36.5 to 38.3 years.

FIGURE 2.1: CLOVIS HISTORIC POPULATION

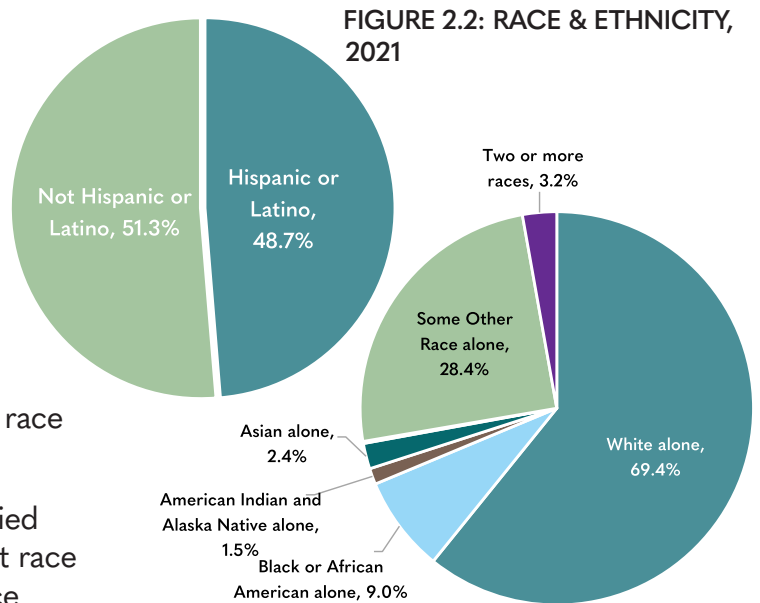

RACE AND ETHNICITY

The U.S. Census Bureau defines race as a person’s self identification with one or more social groups. These categories are not prescribed but are chosen by the respondent in correspondence with their chosen identity. Ethnicity determines whether a person is of Hispanic origin or not. Hispanics may report as any race. In New Mexico, the Hispanic population often identifies their race as “White”.

In 2021, 69.4% of Clovis residents identified their race as “White”. The second highest race category at 28.4% was “Some Other Race Alone”. Residents that identified as Hispanic in 2021 represented 48.7% of the population and 51.3% were Non-Hispanic. The Hispanic population grew by approximately 8.5% since 2011.

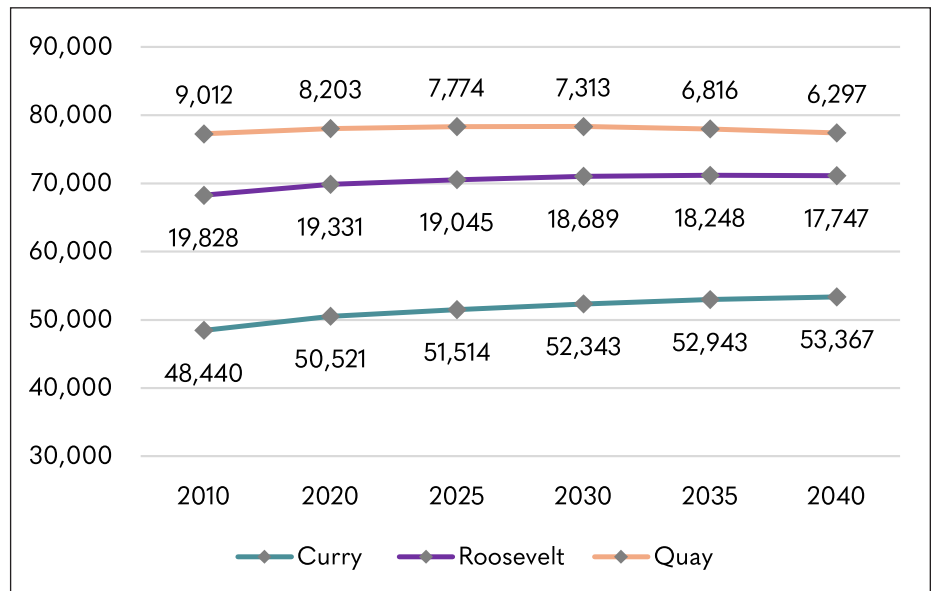

POPULATION PROJECTIONS

The University of New Mexico Geospatial and Population Studies provides population projections on a county level with a base line at 2010 and projections starting in 2020 with 5-year intervals to 2040. The projections show that by 2040, Curry County will grow to a population of 53,367, a 10.2% increase from its 2010 population. In comparison, the 2040 population projections show Quay County decreasing by 30.1% and Roosevelt decreasing by 10.5%. For New Mexico as a whole, the projections show an increase of 3.3% by 2040 (see Figure 2.3).

2.4 HOUSING CHARACTERISTICS

HOUSEHOLDS

In 2021, there were 14,729 households in Clovis. Of those, 9,129 were family households and 5,601 were non-family households. Between 2011 and 2021, the number of households grew by 809, an increase of 5.8%. The average household size remained at 2.6.

In 2021, family households accounted for 62.0% of the total households, a decrease from 66.4%. Non-family households increased by 19.7% during the same time period.

There was slight decrease of .2% in households with one or more persons under 18 years. There was also an increase of 13.6% in households with one or more people 60 years and over. Overall, household trends in Clovis show aging households and a continuing increase in non-family households.

2.4 ECONOMIC CHARACTERISTICS

MEDIAN HOUSEHOLD INCOME

Median household income is an indicator of economic health and growth. Income is calculated based on the total amount of income earned by all members of a household over 15 years of age. Income includes wages, retirement income, bonuses, tips, Social Security and welfare payments.

Between 2011 and 2021, the median income for Clovis grew by 26.1%, from \$39,732 to \$50,109 (see Table 2.3). In comparison, the median household income for New Mexico grew by 21%, from \$44,631 to \$54,020.

The largest growth rate in median household income in Clovis were those with median household incomes of \$150,000 to \$199,999; however, they represent only 2.1% of households in Clovis. Household incomes

3.1 INTRODUCTION

The conceptual site plan for Ned Houk Park illustrates future improvements at Patch Work Place and Pow Wow Pass day use areas, a future RV campground with campsites, a multi-use trail system, a defined motorsports trail area with a dedicated off-highway motor vehicle (OTV) trail system, signage and wayfinding, security system, etc. The conceptual site plan also illustrates existing use areas and improvements, including the Clovis Wing-Shooting Complex and Archery Range, Ned Houk Dam, Motorsports Complex, and the Model Airplane Park.

Improvements identified in the conceptual site plan and Master Plan are intended to be designed and constructed as funding becomes available in the future.

3.2 CONCEPTUAL SITE PLAN

The conceptual site plan illustrates the major use areas within Ned Houk Park. The goal is to provide separation between the more quiet areas containing non-motorized trails, fishing, disc golf, picnicking, play areas, etc. from the more active louder areas, such as the Clovis Wing-Shooting Complex and Archery Range, motorized trails, and the motorsports area. Fencing is shown separating the quiet and loud areas of Ned Houk Park. The major use areas, improvements, and amenities are described below.

Patch Work Place and Pow Wow Pass Day Use Areas

The conceptual site plan shows a wide range of improvements and new amenities at the two existing day use areas, Patch Work Place and Pow Wow Pass (see pages 17-18). The overall conceptual site plan is followed by written descriptions and enlargements of the two day use areas for easier viewing (see pages 20-23 for more detail on the improvements to Patch Work Place and Pow Wow Pass).

Improvements envisioned at Patch Work Place and Pow Wow Pass include:

Patch Work Place

- ◀ Add accessible parking
- ◀ Improve ADA circulation and add paths
- ◀ Expand disc golf course/youth course (9 holes)
- ◀ Expand fishing lake
- ◀ Relocate/replace amphitheater
- ◀ Consolidate and upgrade play area
- ◀ Upgrade picnic facilities
- ◀ Add large group shelter and shelters
- ◀ Improve trailhead

Pow Wow Pass

- ◀ Add accessible parking
- ◀ Improve ADA circulation and add paths
- ◀ Consolidate and upgrade play areas
- ◀ Upgrade picnic facilities
- ◀ Add large group shelter and other shelters
- ◀ Add fenced dog park

Future RV Campground

The conceptual site plan illustrates a 42-acre future RV campground located adjacent to County Road 17, south of Patch Work Place. Motorized and non-motorized trail connections are planned between the RV campground and the drag strip, Shooting Complex. The Master Plan includes a written description and an enlargement of the RV campground (see pages 24-25). The RV campground is envisioned to include:

- ◀ Development of camp sites
- ◀ Comfort station (restroom facilities and showers)
- ◀ Social gathering area
- ◀ Small, fenced dog park

Clovis Wing-Shooting Complex and Archery Range

The conceptual site plan shows the Clovis Wing-Shooting Complex and Archery Range, which opened at Ned Houk Park in October 2022. The facility was developed by the City in partnership with the New Mexico Department

of Game and Fish. Funding was provided from the Pittman-Robertson Act administered by the US Fish and Wildlife Service.

The Shooting Complex is located adjacent to County Road 17 and the Archery Range is located adjacent to NM 209 at the northwest corner of the Park. The facilities include four trap/skeet overlay fields, a 12-station sporting clays course, indoor and outdoor archery ranges, an indoor airgun range, and the Joe C. Thomas Hunter Education Center. Hunter education students have the opportunity to develop firearm safety skills, archery students to practice what they learn in the classroom, and hunters to sight in their hunting equipment. The Shooting Complex is open on Thursday through Sunday from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Twelve-gauge or smaller shotguns are allowed.

The following list of activities are prohibited at the Shooting Complex and Archery Range:

- ◀ All cell phones placed on silent mode.
- ◀ No illegal firearms.
- ◀ No shooting wildlife.
- ◀ No shooting cross-range.
- ◀ No smoking allowed.
- ◀ No consumption of alcoholic beverages or drugs before or during live fire activities.
- ◀ No bullet impacts off the range.
- ◀ No loaded firearms are allowed on the range property other than on the Firing Line and designated Firing Areas.
- ◀ All guns must be carried and unloaded with the breach/action open.
- ◀ Eye and hearing protection on the Shooting Range, including spectators.

Model Airplane Park

The conceptual site plan shows the existing 22-acre model airplane park located to the east of NM 209 and Pow Wow Pass. The results of the Community Survey demonstrated a continued

interest in maintaining this use at Ned Houk Park. The Clovis Model Airplane Driver Society has utilized this area for many years; however, other model airplane enthusiasts are welcome.

Motorsports Complex

The conceptual site plan shows the 83-acre Motorsports Complex adjacent to County Road 17 and east of the Clovis Wing-Shooting Complex at the far east end of Ned Houk Park. The Motorsports Complex has not been in operation for several years. The City issued a Request for Proposal and entered into a contract with a local business to rehabilitate and utilize the facility as a motocross, motorsports racing, and/or riding venue for public use.

The rehabilitation of the facility is anticipated to be completed in four phases within a total time frame of approximately 1.5 years:

- ◀ Initial cleanup and track construction
- ◀ Expansion and enhancement
- ◀ Preparation for round track reconstruction
- ◀ Full-scale construction and operational readiness

In addition to the rehabilitation, the contract requires that the lessee develop an operations plan that amongst other responsibilities, ensure that services and facilities at the Motorsports Complex comply with ADA guidelines; provide a paramedic, EMT, and an equipped EMS ambulance at all events; maintain the facility and make appropriate repairs as needed; maintain accident reports; pay annual rent to the City; maintain liability and fire insurance; etc.

Trails

The conceptual site plan illustrates non-motorized and motorized trails systems (see pages 17-18). The trail systems are further described and illustrated in the Master Plan (see pages 34-35).

Drag Strip

The conceptual site plan provides an 80-acre, 1/2-mile Drag Strip area adjacent to County Road 17 and to the west of the Clovis Wing-Shooting Complex. The track will require a flat surface and asphalt paving.

The typical racing distance is 1/4 mile (1,320 feet) in length. Additional space is required for a burnout area to heat up the tires for better traction, a braking area that goes past the finish line where vehicles can decelerate, and a return road at the end of the drag strip to hold the race cars until they are picked up by their crew. Preparation for a drag race typically requires a tire dragger to spread rubber onto the drag strip surface and glue on top of the rubber.

Parking and Accessibility

One of the primary goals for the Master Plan is to increase accessibility at Ned Houk Park. The goal is accomplished through the provision of accessible pathways and parking, including ADA designated parking spaces, throughout the main areas of Ned Houk Park. The conceptual site plan shows parking spaces along the edges of the primary use areas and a large parking lot close to the fishing lake at Patch Work Place. Paved ADA parking spaces with ADA access pathways leading from the parking spaces to destinations within the Park are shown throughout the primary use areas.

Signage and Wayfinding

With a facility as large as Ned Houk Park, it is important that a coordinated signage and

wayfinding system be installed. A series of sign types, including a main entry sign off NM 209, placemaker signs at the major use areas, kiosks with an overall map of Ned Houk Park, directional signs, and trail-marker signs, should be a priority project. The Master Plan includes several conceptual sign family options, each using different types of materials (see pages 28-30). The conceptual sign options are followed by a Wayfinding Plan that illustrates the locations where signs should be placed at the Park (see pages 31-32).

Buffalo Herd and Wild Animal Park

The existing 80-acre Buffalo Herd area is located to the east of Patch Work Place. The buffalo have been at Ned Houk Park for over 20 years. This is a good location for the herd; however, an alternative area for the buffalo herd and potentially other wild animals, is the northern area of Ned Houk Park where there is less activity and further away from motorized vehicles. Wild animal parks differ from zoos by allowing the animals to engage in their natural behaviors. They are also a popular draw for tourists. The City should consider the development of a wild animal park as a future project at Ned Houk Park.

Security

Providing security at Ned Houk Park is an important element. The recommendation is to place security cameras at the major entry into Ned Houk Park, Patch Work Place, Pow Wow Pass, RV Campground, Motorsports Complex, and the Shooting Complex.

PATCH WORK PLACE DAY USE AREA

Patch Work Place is a well used area of Ned Houk Park, particularly for events and family gatherings, fishing, and disc golf. The conceptual site plan shows a wide range of improvements to Patch Work Place Day Use Area.

Fishing Lake

The existing fishing lake is a popular amenity at Ned Houk. The New Mexico Department of Game & Fish stocks the lake with winter rainbow trout and summer catfish. The area around the lake has drainage issues and is eroding and blowing dirt into the lake during storm events and high winds. The site plan shows the expansion of the lake to the west and a series of berms placed to the south of the lake to intercept drainage and prevent further erosion and accumulation of silt in the lake.

Improved Parking Area & Trailhead

Patch Work Place currently has a large parking area to the southeast of the lake. As mentioned above, drainage coming off of the parking area is washed into the pond. The parking area has been reconfigured into rows of parking spaces and should be paved with asphalt. ADA paved parking spaces are shown along the east edge of this area to allow for convenient access to the lake and amphitheater. An improved trailhead is shown at the northeast corner of the parking area.

Expanded Disc Golf

Disk golf is another very popular activity at Ned Houk Park. The site plan shows an expanded 9-hole disc golf area to the north of the existing disc golf, for a total of 27 holes. Parking is provided between the two disc golf areas. New trees are interspersed between the holes.

Play Areas

There are currently many play areas at Ned Houk with play equipment that has reached its useful life (typically 10 years) and in need of replacement. The number of play areas is

excessive and there is no need or desire to maintain a large number of play areas. The site plan shows a centralized and consolidated area divided into three separate play areas. A group shelter is shown in the center of the consolidated play area, close to ADA designated parking spaces.

The play areas should be designed with age appropriate equipment, surfacing in accordance with safety standards recommended by the National Safety Council, and a formal edge around the play areas to help contain loose fill. It is recommended that signs be posted regarding the age range of play equipment users. Hot surface warnings and other material related risks are required per the American Society for Test and Materials and Consumer Product Safety Commission Standards.

ADA Parking & Accessibility

ADA accessible parking and pathways are currently lacking at Ned Houk Park. The conceptual site plan shows parking around the edges of Patch Work Place, and includes designated paved ADA parking spaces dispersed throughout the area. An accessible pathway is provided from each ADA parking area to destinations within Patch Work Place. The ADA parking spaces should be designated with a handicapped sign and pavement markings. A minimum of one of every six spaces should be van accessible.

Amphitheater

Ned Houk Park currently has a band shell that is not in good condition and not well placed within Patch Work Place. Participants in the community survey indicated a desire for outdoor concerts at Ned Houk Park. The conceptual site plan shows a new amphitheater with the lake as its back drop and a large lawn area for concert goers. The amphitheater is conveniently located close to parking areas and surrounded by berms. The lawn area can serve a dual purpose of containing stormwater and help prevent runoff into the lake.

Pow Wow Pass, located close to the main entry from County Road 209, is another popular day use area at Ned Houk Park. The conceptual site plan shows a wide range of improvements to Patch Work Place Day Use Area.

Play Areas

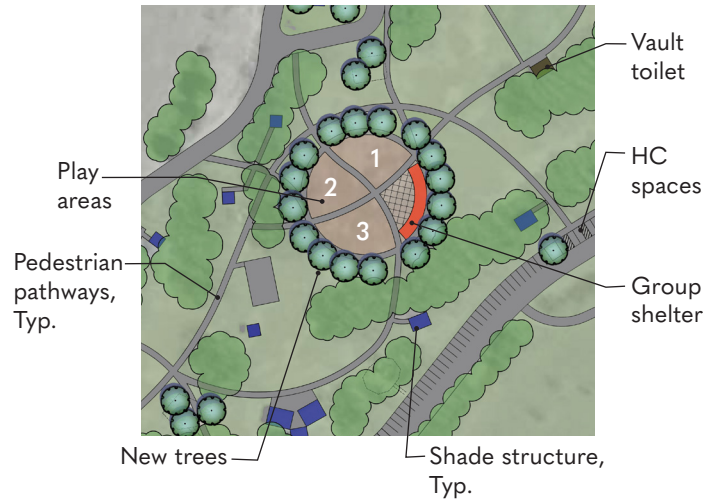
There are currently several play areas at or near Pow Wow Pass; like Patch Work Place, the play equipment has reached its useful life and should be replaced. The site plan shows a centralized area divided into three separate play areas. A group shelter is provided along the east edge and shade trees are shown around the perimeter of the play areas. Pedestrian pathways lead to the centralized area from all areas of Pow Wow Pass.

The three play areas should be designed with age appropriate equipment, surfacing in accordance with safety standards recommended by the National Safety Council, and a formal edge around the play areas to help contain loose fill. Signs stating the age range of equipment users should be posted. Hot surface warnings and other material related risks are required per the American Society for Test and Materials and Consumer Product Safety Commission Standards.

Dog Park

The conceptual site plan shows a fenced, off-leash dog park at the south end of Pow Wow Pass (see *Fencing details, page 36*). The dog park includes two separated areas for large and small dogs, .7-acres and .4-acres, respectively. Amenities within the dog park should include pet waste stations, a water source, shade structures, benches, and trash receptacles. Both areas contain a double-gated leashing area to prevent dogs from escaping out of the dog park. The dog park should include a posted sign that lists the rules for use of the dog park, including but not limited to:

- ◀ Dog owners assume all risk related to



dog park use and is legally and financially responsible for the actions of their dog.

- ◀ Dog handlers must have a leash in their possession at all times.
- ◀ Dogs must be kept on a leash until inside the double-gated entry and when leaving.
- ◀ Dogs must be under voice control and in sight of their owners at all times.
- ◀ Any dog exhibiting aggressive behavior must be leashed and removed immediately.
- ◀ Owners must clean up and properly dispose of waste left by their dog(s).
- ◀ Puppies less than six months are not allowed in the dog park.
- ◀ Children younger than 12 are not allowed in the dog park unless accompanied by an adult.

ADA Parking

The conceptual site plan shows parking around the edges of Pow Wow Pass, and includes designated paved ADA parking spaces. An accessible pathway is provided from each ADA parking area to destinations within Pow Wow Pass. The ADA parking spaces should be designated with a handicapped sign and pavement markings. A minimum of one of every six handicapped spaces should be van accessible.

RV CAMPGROUND AREA

The conceptual site plan shows a future RV campground area to the south of Patch Work Place. The site plan includes 37 campsites with a combination of pull-through and back-in style campsites. Amenities for the campers include a comfort station, a social gathering area, and a vault toilet.

Of the 37 campsites shown on the conceptual site plan, a minimum of two campsites should be ADA accessible. The ADA campsites should be located close and connected to the common amenities via paved pedestrian pathways. The future campground will include a social gathering area in the center of the campground and connected to the campsites via crusher fine pathways.

Comfort Station

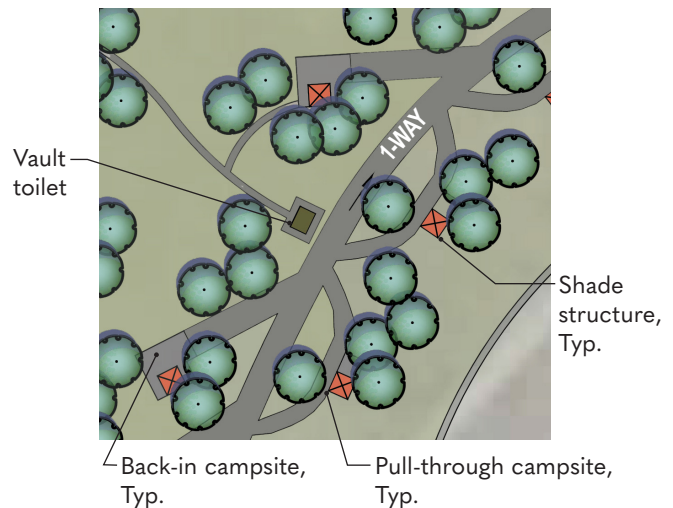
A comfort station is planned at a central location within the RV campground area. The RV campground and comfort station should be operational from April to November.

Facilities within the comfort station should include toilets, urinals, and showers. It is assumed that the design for the comfort station will include a septic tank and drain field for sewage treatment, which will take up a significant area.

The following infrastructure should be included in the design of the RV campground and associated comfort station:

- ◀ Domestic water supply
- ◀ Electrical service
- ◀ Heating system
- ◀ Exhaust ventilation
- ◀ Shutoff valves for winterizing the building
- ◀ Solid surface lavatories

The comfort station could either be site-built or pre-manufactured and installed in place. The design should include separate access points for family/gender neutral rooms from a shared vestibule or outside. This would also



allow for a design solution that limits shower access to overnight RV campers only.

Social Gathering Area




The site plan shows a social gathering area in the center of the RV campground and connected to the campsites via crusher fine pathways. The social gathering area is designed with two separate seating areas with seat walls, fire pits, a paved surface between the two areas, and shade trees. The social gathering area is connected to the vault toilet and accessible campsites via concrete pathways for accessibility purposes.

Dog Park

A fenced, off-leash dog park (approximately .25-acre) is planned at the north area of the RV campground. It is designed to connect to the pedestrian pathways that run through the RV campground. Similar amenities to the dog park at Pow Wow Pass should be provided, including a pet waste station, a shade structure, benches, and trash receptacles. A double-gated leashing area should be provided to prevent dogs from escaping the dog park. A posted sign should list the rules for use of the dog park (see page 22 for the rules).

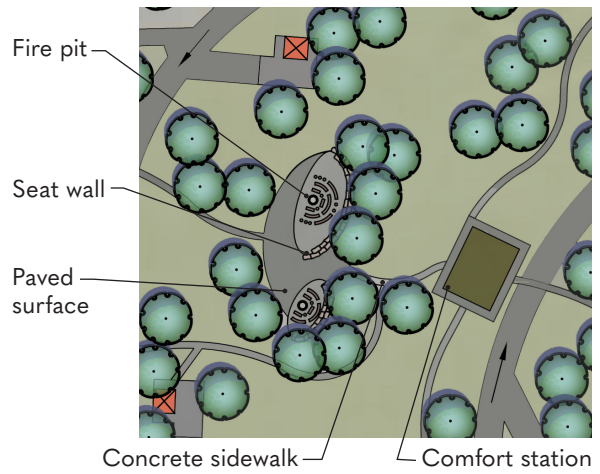

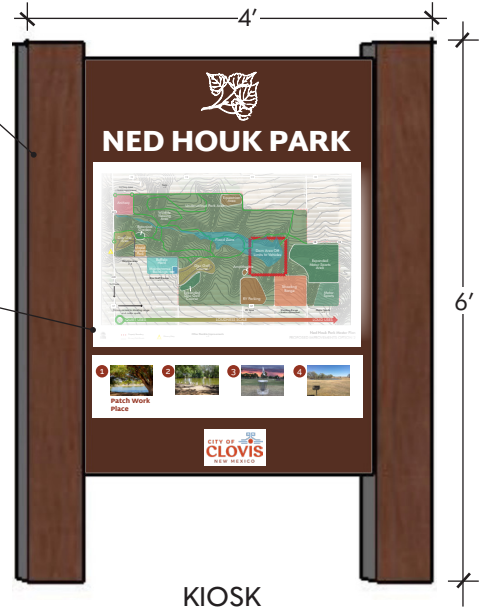
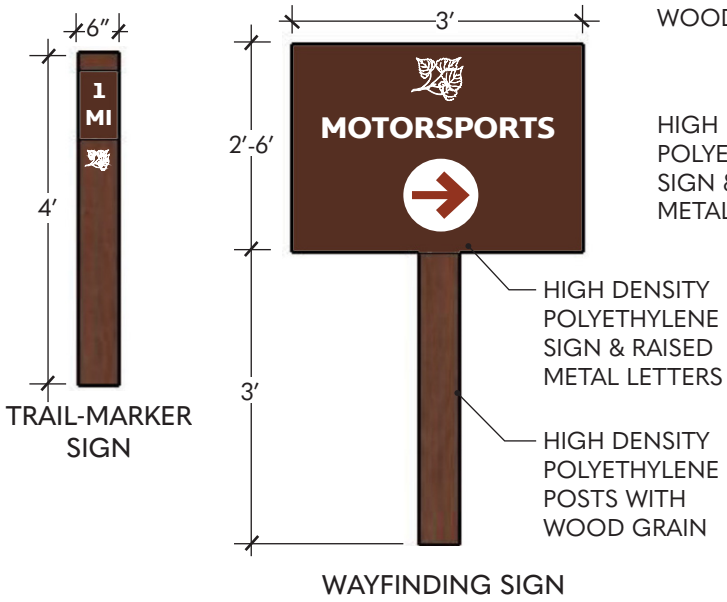
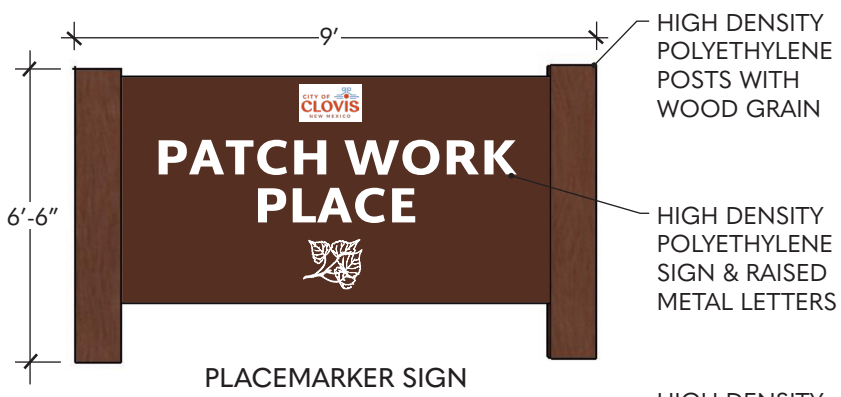
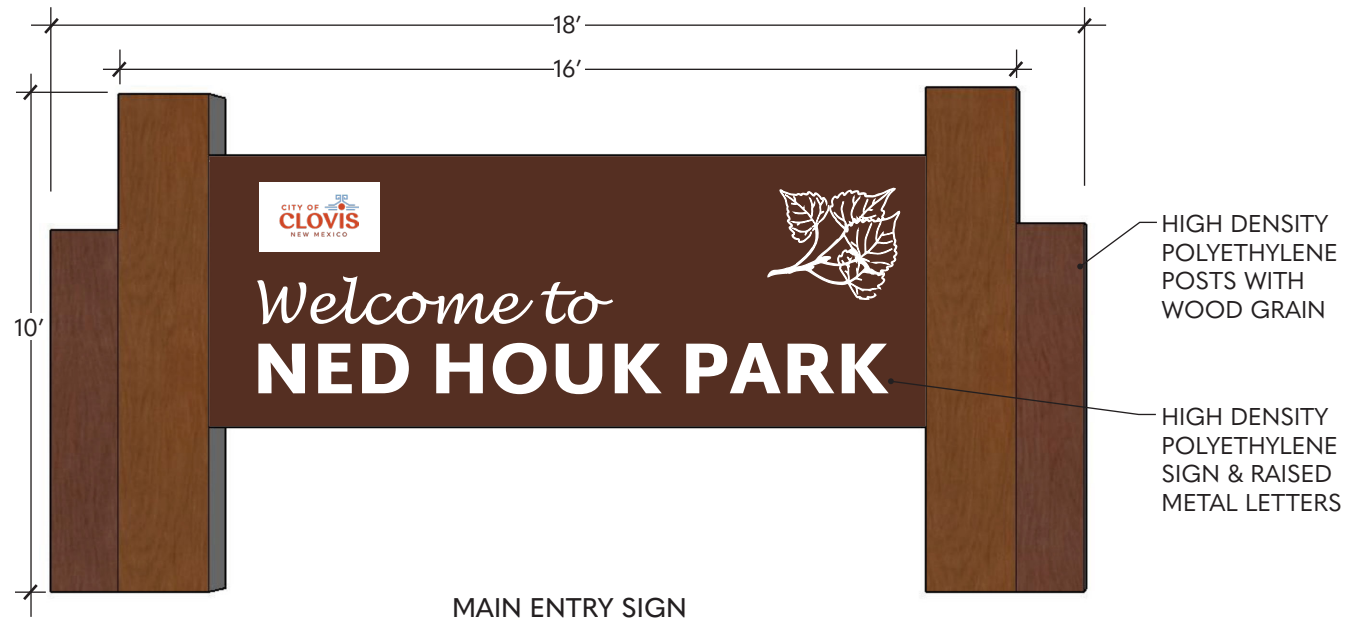
COMFORT STATION

AMPHITHEATER

The results of the Community Survey revealed great interest in hosting concerts at Ned Houk Park. The amphitheater shown on the conceptual site plan is anticipated to be a strong draw for visitors to the Park.

The images on this page are examples of amphitheaters showing a variety of materials, such as wood and steel beams, metal roofs, and cantilevers. Several examples show a large lawn area for attendees and some employ a more formalized design with seat walls.



TRAILS

The conceptual site plan illustrates separate trails for motorized and non-motorized use. The motorized trail system is designed to accommodate off-highway vehicles (OHV), including all-terrain vehicles (ATV), off-highway motorcycles (OHM), recreational off-highway vehicles (ROV), and snowmobiles (if weather allows). The non-motorized trail system is designed to accommodate walkers, runners, and equestrians.

Motorized Trails

The motorized trail system for OHVs is contained within the 912-acre Motorsports Trail Area and is illustrated on the conceptual site plan. The intent is to contain this use within a defined area separate from the non-motorized trails. To accomplish this goal, a fence is shown on the conceptual site plan defining the area where this use is allowed at the Park. The typical OHV trail section will have a 12-foot compacted dirt trail and a drainage swale/bar ditch to ensure the trail drains properly during storm events (see page 35).

The use of OHVs in New Mexico is regulated under the Off-Highway Vehicle Act (66-3-1001 through 66-3-1021 NMSA). All users of the OHV trails at Ned Houk Park are required to register their OHVs with the New Mexico Motor Vehicle Division. Non-residents of New Mexico are required to obtain a use permit from the New Mexico Department of Game & Fish or online at www.B4Uride.com.

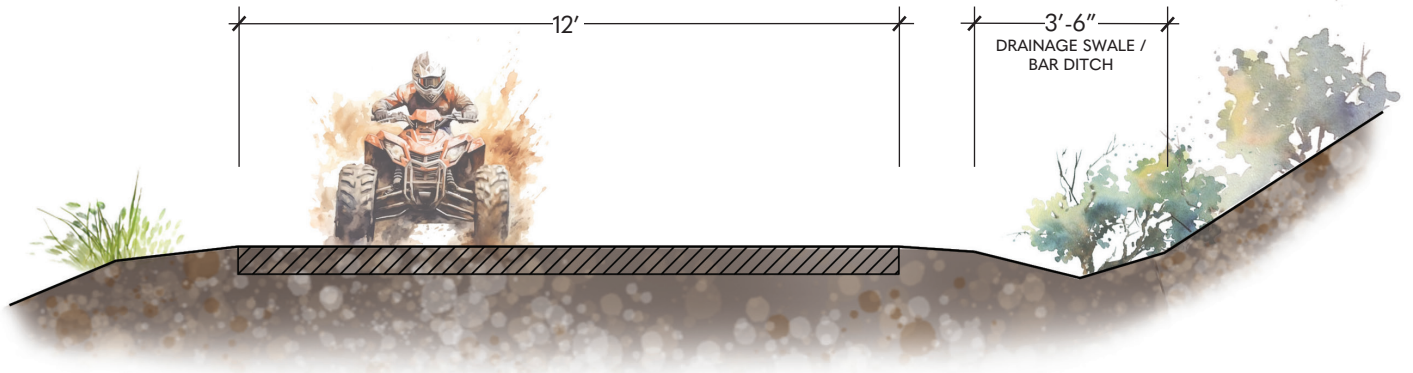
Non-Motorized Trails

The non-motorized trail system is contained within the 1,110-acre Passive Recreation Area and is illustrated on the conceptual site plan. There are approximately 12.2 miles of existing trails and 4.1 miles of new trails shown on the conceptual site plan. The existing and future trails should be bladed and compacted to an appropriate width and hard surface. The typical non-motorized trail will have a 10-foot trail

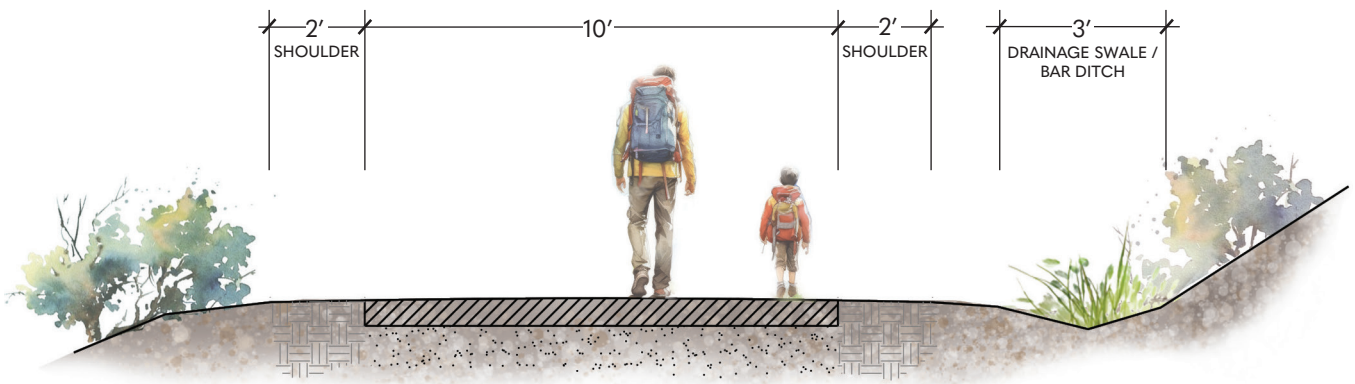
width, 2-foot shoulders, and a 3-foot drainage swale/bar ditch on one side. The multi-use trails for walkers/runners and equestrians will include a 10-foot trail and an 8-foot equestrian trail with a 2-foot swale in the center separating the two trails, and a 3-foot drainage swale/bar ditch on one side.

Trailheads and Trail Markers

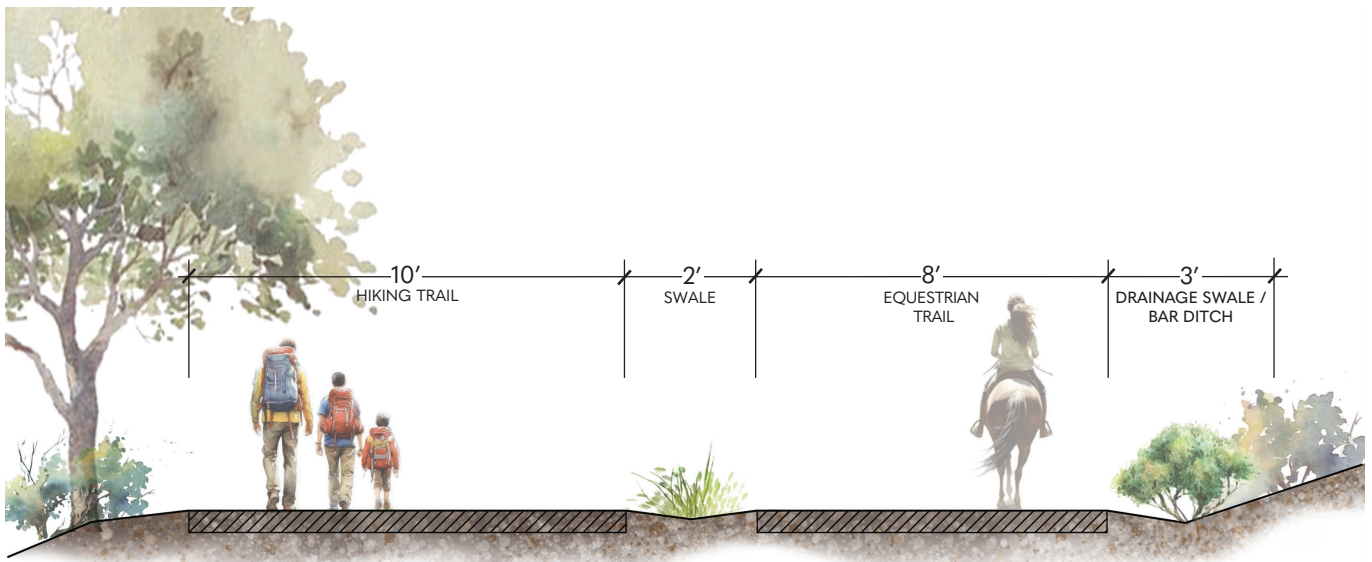
Trailheads are illustrated in several locations on the conceptual site plan, including at Patch Work Place, Pow Wow Pass, and the northern area east of the Archery Range. Parking and signage will be provided in these locations. The signage and wayfinding plan illustrates the locations for placement of trail markers and directional signage to keep trail users informed of where they are in the Park. A series of optional signage designs are provided in the Master Plan (see pages 28-30).

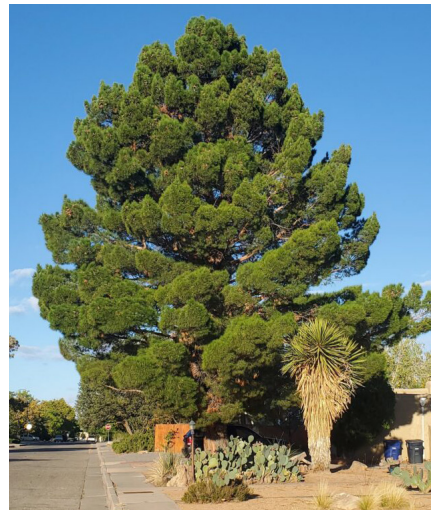

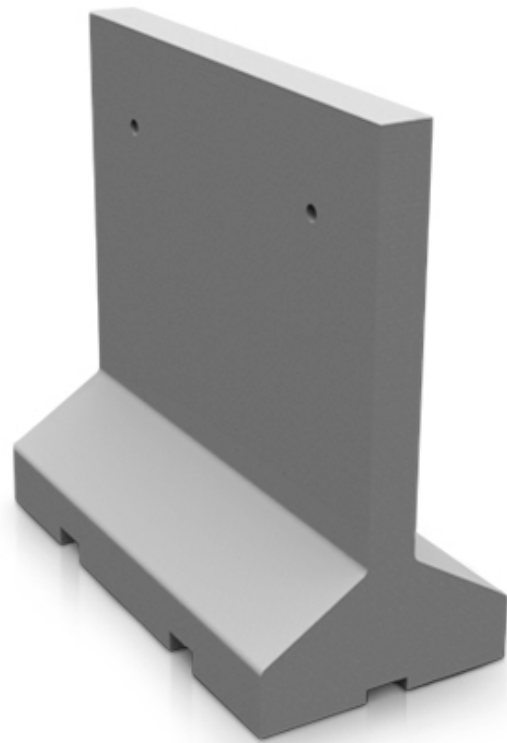

FENCING

An important goal of the Master Plan is to create a separation between the non-motorized and motorized trails at Ned Houk Park. In order to achieve this goal, permanent fencing as illustrated on the conceptual site plan, approximately 25,000 linear feet or 4.74 miles, will be required. The existing fencing at the Park has been vandalized in the past; therefore, the City will need to choose a fencing material that is durable, vandal resistant, and tall enough to prevent OHV riders from breaching the fence line into the more quiet recreational areas.

In addition to the trail fence, the Master Plan also identifies a fenced dog park at Pow Wow Pass. The welded steel mesh fence or chain link would be appropriate at the dog park.

4.1 INTRODUCTION

This section provides a summary of funding resources that could be utilized by the City of Clovis to help defray the cost of improving and adding new amenities at Ned Houk Park. The available contact information is listed under the description, where applicable.

4.2 PUBLIC FUNDS / GOVERNMENT SPONSORED

FEDERAL and STATE GRANTS

A federal or state grant can be issued to a municipality to build, rehabilitate, or improve a parks and recreation program or facility. These grants are typically funded by the municipality's General Fund and can vary in award amount.

GENERAL FUND APPROPRIATION

The most common method of obtaining funding for parks and recreation annual operating budgets is to receive an appropriation from the municipality's general fund. The money from the general fund is usually levied on the taxable property of the taxing district.

GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS

Bonding is the process of a government entity borrowing money for capital improvements and then paying back the borrowed money over a period of years through property tax revenue. A tax is levied on taxable property. The obligation is spread over all community residents through an increased tax for the period of time that the bond repayment is in effect. General obligation bonds require approval by registered voters at a special or general election and are a common method of funding specific capital improvements by purpose. The available bonding capacity is the result of the amount of revenue available from property taxes.

NEW MEXICO FOREST RE-LEAF PROGRAM

The New Mexico Forest Re-Leaf Program has awarded more than \$500,000 to support tree planting projects in communities and schools across New Mexico. Since its inception through the State Legislature in 1990, the Re-Leaf Program has awarded funds and resources to cities, towns, villages, and schools. Annual applications are solicited in April and submittals are due in August. Trees must be planted on public land.

NEW MEXICO SMALL CITIES COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program was established under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, in order to assist communities in providing essential community facilities, providing decent housing for residents, promoting economic development and maintaining a suitable living environment. State and national objectives of the New Mexico CDBG Program requires that assistance be made available for activities that principally benefit persons of low and moderate income. Applications are limited to a maximum of \$500,000 without certified cost estimates and \$750,000 with certified cost estimates by a licensed professional. Planning applications are limited to \$50,000. CDBG grants can be used for community infrastructure, public facilities, economic development, colonias, and housing.

REVENUE BONDS

A revenue bond is a municipal bond supported by the revenue from a specific project. Revenue bonds finance income producing projects and are secured by a specified revenue source. Revenue bonds are typically issued by a government entity or fund that is run in the manner of a business – those entities having both operating revenues and expenses.

SPECIAL REVENUE FUND

A special revenue fund is an account set up by a government entity and is dedicated to funding a specific project. This account is funded by taxpayers and provides a level of accountability that the funding will go towards the intended purpose.

4.3 TAXES & FEES

SPECIAL ASSESSMENT DISTRICT

A special assessment tax is levied against real property if the parcels have directly benefited from a public improvement project. Similar to special assessments used to finance improvements for streets, curbs, sidewalks, sewers, and other such project improvements or additions, a parks and recreation assessment to specific community areas could be considered in a special assessment tax basis.

SPECIAL TAX LEVY

The Special Tax Levy is a special tax and is spent only for the specified earmarked source. A special tax levy alleviates pressure from the municipality's General Fund and eliminates competition for special projects with other community agencies.

4.4 STATE & FEDERAL PROGRAMS

HEALTHY PARKS HEALTHY PEOPLE

Healthy Parks Healthy People is a global movement that harnesses the power of parks and public lands as a health resource. Healthy Parks Healthy People works to advance the fact that all parks - urban and wildland - are cornerstones of people's physical, mental, and spiritual health, social wellbeing; and sustainability of the planet. By promoting parks as a health resource, the National Park Service aims to bring about lasting change in American's lifestyle choices and their relationship with nature and the outdoors. Although Healthy Parks Healthy People is based within the National Park Service, the program works with national, state, and local parks, as well as business innovators, healthcare leaders, scientists, foundations and advocacy organizations, to advance the role that parks play in the health of our society.

INTERNATIONAL MOUNTAIN BIKING ASSOCIATION (IMBA)

The IMBA provides Trail Accelerator Grants to jump-start trail building in communities that have the interest and political support to develop trail systems but need assistance to get projects up and running. Grants typically range from \$5,000 to \$30,000 and require a one-to-one match. Projects that will be considered include those that will increase access to mountain bike experiences; leverage additional resources to ensure success of the project; and promote community development, including engaging marginalized

community members. There are two grant application periods; in spring and summer.

LAND and WATER CONSERVATION FUND

The Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) has provided funding to help protect some of New Mexico's most special places and ensure recreational access for hunting, fishing and other outdoor activities. The LWCF Fund Act of 1965 (P.L. 85-578) created the program to stimulate, encourage and assist state and local governments to acquire, develop and improve viable outdoor recreation areas and facilities. State agencies, municipalities, counties, schools, and tribes have developed and improved over 1,000 close-to-home outdoor recreation areas in response to the needs of its citizens and visitors. Community projects include parks, baseball and soccer fields, trails, playgrounds, and picnic areas.

NEW MEXICO OUTDOOR RECREATION (NMOR)

The NMOR is a division of the New Mexico Economic Development Department. It was created to grow and champion outdoor recreation in New Mexico as a powerful economic engine to expand wealth and job opportunities. The NMOR administers the following three funding programs:

Outdoor Equity Fund - This fund aims to support transformative outdoor experiences for New Mexico youth that foster stewardship and respect for New Mexico lands, waters, and cultural heritage. Applicants must be from an area that serves a population where at least 40% of youth are low income. Awards range from \$1,500 to \$15,000.

Outdoor Recreation Incubators - This grant program is geared to business incubators that assist early stage outdoor recreation companies. These awards are \$50,000 and eligible programs can include those that support startups in service, retail, and manufacturing.

Special Projects and Infrastructure Fund - This grant program supports projects that enhance trails, river parks, wildlife viewing areas, and other infrastructure projects that enhance outdoor recreation primarily in rural, tribal, and traditional land-grant communities. Awards are between \$5,000 and \$25,000 for projects that are shovel ready and can be completed within 24 months of the award.

RECREATIONAL TRAILS PROGRAM

The Recreational Trails Program (RTP) is a federal reimbursement program and provides funding to eligible entities within New Mexico to develop and maintain recreational trails and trail-related facilities for both non-motorized and motorized uses. These federal funds benefit recreationalists who enjoy hiking, bicycling, in-line skating, equestrianism, cross-country skiing, snowmobiling, off-road motorcycling, all-terrain vehicle riding, and off-road four-wheel driving. RTP funds come from the Federal Highway Trust Fund and represent

a portion of the motor fuel excise tax collected from non-highway recreational fuel used for off-highway recreation by snowmobiles, etc. New Mexico's estimated annual RTP funding amount is approximately \$1.4 million each year, with 30% for non-motorized trails, 30% for motorized trails, 40% for diverse-use trails, and up to 5% for educational programs.

USA ARCHERY EXPLORE ARCHERY GRANT

The USA Archery Explore Archery Grant is administered by USA Archery thanks to generous contributions by The Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies (AFWA) and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS). The goal is to expand archery into new

communities across the United States, to recruit diverse instructors and to grow archery in urban and suburban areas. Applicants should plan to send two employees per to attend a one-day USA Archery Instructor Academy. Upon completion, participants will be certified as a USA Archery Level 2 Instructor and be well prepared to implement the Explore Archery Program. Selected applicants will receive the Explore Archery Program curriculum and achievement awards, a range rules and steps of shooting poster and the equipment necessary to implement Explore Archery programs for beginners.

WILDLIFE RESTORATION PROGRAM

US Fish & Wildlife Service provides grant funds to states and fish and wildlife agencies for projects to restore, conserve, manage and enhance wild birds and mammals and their habitat. Projects include providing public use and access to wildlife resources, wildlife area acquisition and management, research, hunter education and development and management of shooting ranges. Funds from manufacturer taxes on ammunition, firearms, and archery equipment go toward projects to restore, conserve, manage and enhance wild birds and mammals and their habitats. States and territories also use these funds to support access for wildlife-related recreation, hunter education and development, and the construction and operations of target ranges.

4.5 PUBLIC/PRIVATE PARTNERSHIPS

ADOPT A PARK PROGRAM

An "Adopt a Park" program has been used by several communities. While not a dedicated funding source, the Adopt-a-Park program assists maintenance crews. The program functions by the municipality partnering with local businesses or organizations, who in turn, assist with the upkeep of the park and perform certain types of maintenance

activities such as painting or fixing equipment. The business benefits by being recognized through signage placed at the park, which serves as a form of advertising. While this program would not be a direct form of funding park facilities, having a local business perform upkeep functions such as cleaning up weeds, trash removal, and other minor tasks would free up staff time to undertake other projects.

NAMING RIGHTS

Naming rights gives businesses the opportunity to place their name on a facility after purchasing that right from a local entity. The naming rights contract is typically set up for a period of up to several years with the business paying a yearly fee. A corporation typically purchases the naming rights to the stadium for a fee in exchange for significant exposure, particularly if the team and stadium are on television often. Monies generated from the naming rights are applied towards the maintenance and upkeep of the facility. Naming rights have been used for New Mexico facilities and events, including the Isleta Amphitheater, Church's Chicken Soccer Complex in Bernalillo, former Dreamstyle Arena, and Rio Grande Credit Union Field at the Isotopes Stadium.

MEMORIALS

Some communities utilize a "Living Tribute" program where trees are planted at parks to commemorate a significant life event. For example, the City of Fort Collins operates a Living Tribute program in which individuals or organizations can purchase and dedicate trees that are then planted in its parks to celebrate an employee of the year, a marriage, birth, or in memory of a departed loved one. Individuals or organizations can either dedicate the money for the trees to the municipality or purchase live trees for planting in parks.

PARKS and RECREATION FOUNDATION

A parks and recreation foundation provides a vehicle for receiving gifts and endowments from individuals and organizations that are interested in assisting the parks and recreation agency. A foundation can attract donations from citizens, businesses, and other foundations. The agency's legal counsel should be consulted for establishing a foundation sponsored by the agency for the receiving of gifts and contribution. Depending on the type of foundation established, contributors may receive signification tax advantages.

4.6 PRIVATE FOUNDATION GRANTS & INITIATIVES

CORPORATE GIVING

Corporations may choose to sponsor various parks and recreation programs, as well as provide major funding for new projects. As an example, the "Adopt-A-Park" program where a corporate group agrees to pay the operation and maintenance costs of a park for a specific period of time as a contribution to the local community. An additional approach is the "5% Program", which is based on the IRS rule allowing a 5% write-off for corporate gifts to community service agencies.

KABOOM!

KABOOM! is a national non-profit that works with low income and/or special needs communities to build "incredible, kid-designed playspaces." KABOOM! has teamed with partners and community members, starting with the kids themselves, to understand each neighborhood's unique aspirations and then build incredible places to play, inspired by their design, courage, and leadership.

PeopleForBikes

PeopleForBikes is a community grant program that supports bicycle infrastructure projects and targeted advocacy initiatives that make it easier and safer for people of all ages and abilities to ride. Grant applications are accepted from non-profit organizations and governmental entities for projects that focus on bicycling, active transportation, or community development. Funding can be up to \$10,000 with no specific match required, but leverage and funding partnerships are given a high priority. Projects that the grant would make up more than 50% of the cost will not be considered. Grant funds focus on bicycle infrastructure projects and advocacy projects such as:

- ▶ Bike paths, lanes, trails, and bridges;
- ▶ Mountain bike facilities;
- ▶ Bike parks and pump tracks;
- ▶ BMX facilities;
- ▶ Bike racks, bike parking, bike repair stations and bike storage;
- ▶ Programs that transform city streets, such as Ciclovías or Open Streets Days; and
- ▶ Campaigns to increase the investment in bicycle infrastructure.

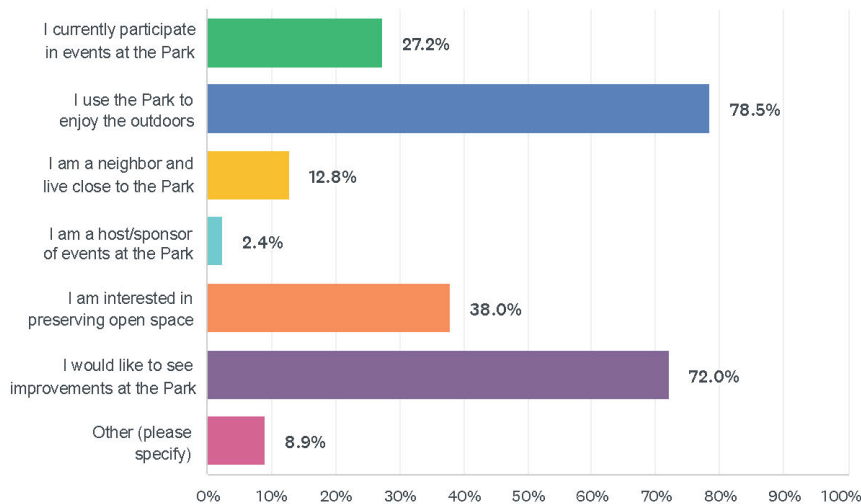
INTRODUCTION

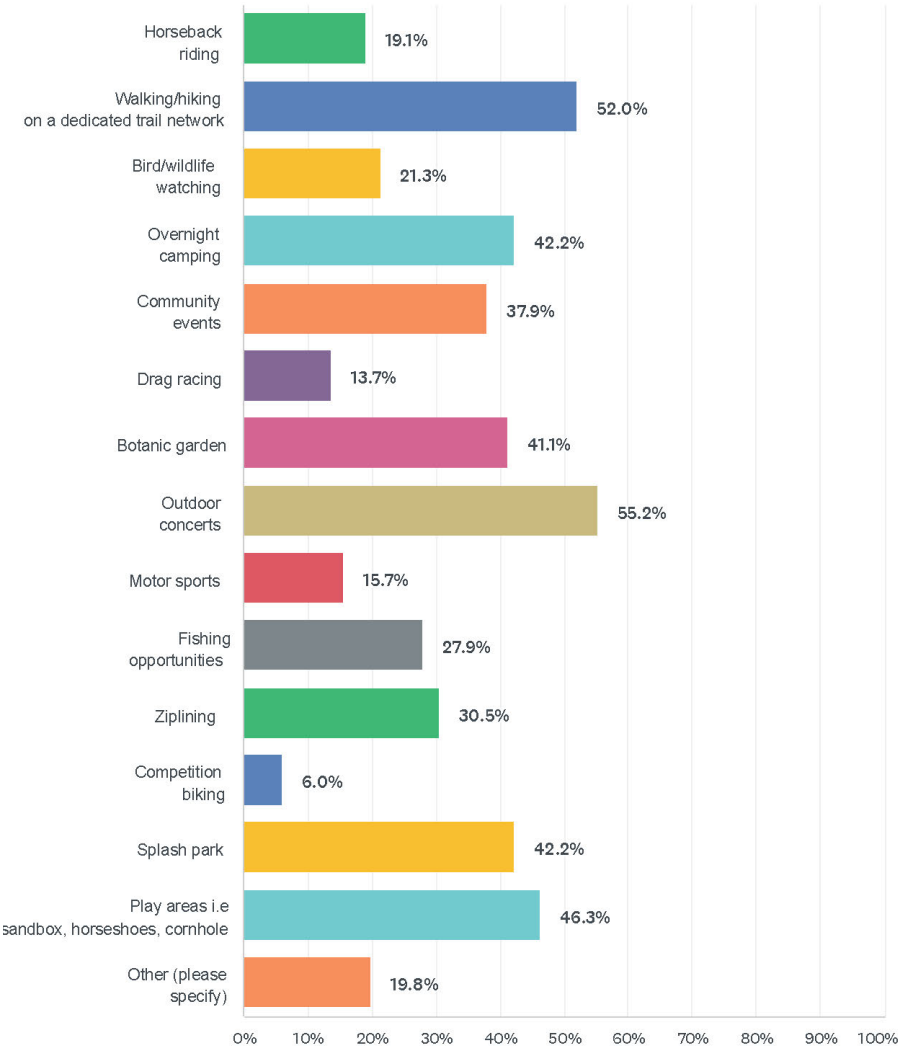

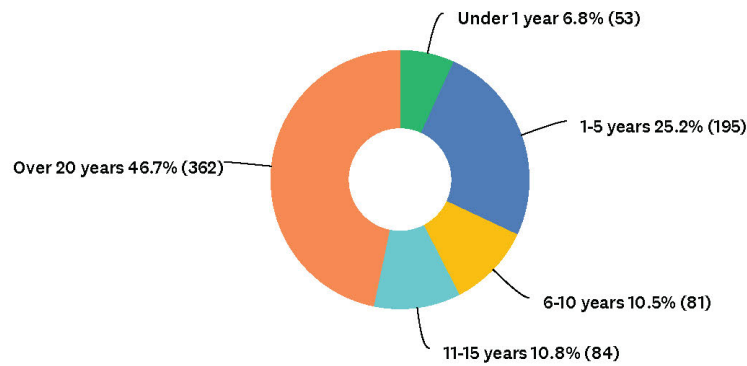
Q6 If improvements were made at the Park how likely would you or your family be to visit the Park more often?

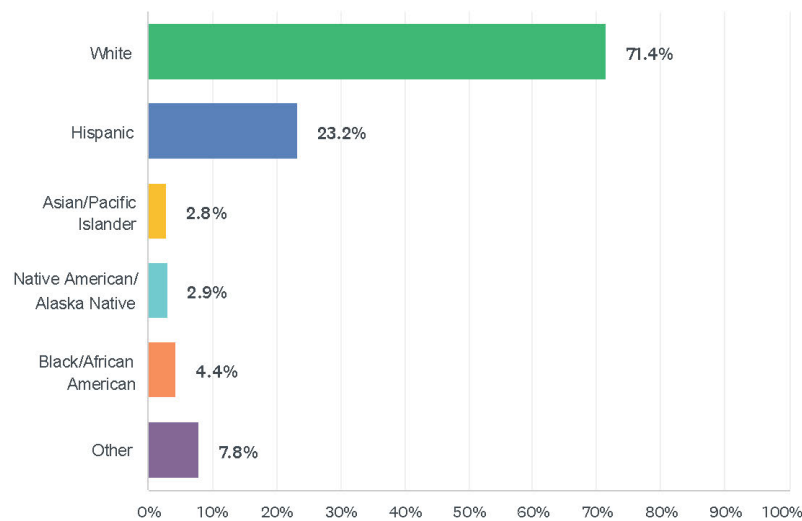
Q7 How many years have you lived in Clovis?

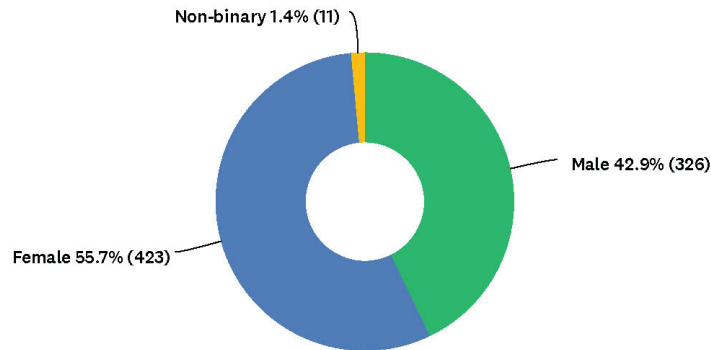
Q8 How do you describe your race/ethnicity? (Please check all that apply)

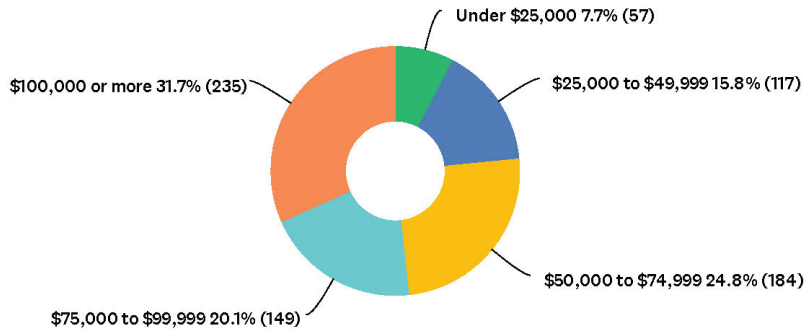
Q9 What is your gender?
